While not a single FAA publication, many aviation publishers offer books that consolidate and explain the specific regulations and procedural requirements for CFIs. These often include parts of the FARs and ACS (Airman Certification Standards) relevant to instructors and their students. Understanding these is paramount for compliance and successful training.

8. Aviation Weather for Pilots and Planners (AWS)

This detailed book provides an in-depth understanding of meteorological principles as they apply to aviation. It covers weather phenomena, forecasting, and the interpretation of weather reports and charts. An instructor must be able to teach weather safety and decision-making effectively.

9. The Complete Private Pilot (ASA)

Although geared towards private pilot certification, this book covers many of the fundamental skills and knowledge that a CFI would be expected to teach and test on. It provides a solid foundation in aircraft operation, navigation, regulations, and decision-making, making it a good reference for reinforcing basic concepts.

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
