Readers can expect imaginative twists and engaging narratives that often explore the inner lives of fairy tale characters.

### 6. Cinderella and the Glass Slipper by Jane B. Mason

This is a straightforward, beautifully illustrated retelling of the classic Cinderella story. It faithfully captures the magic and romance of the original fairy tale, from the cruel stepmother and stepsisters to the fairy godmother's intervention and the iconic lost slipper. This book is perfect for younger readers or those who cherish the traditional telling.

### 7. A Court of Thorns and Roses by Sarah J. Maas

While not a direct Cinderella retelling, this fantasy novel shares strong thematic and structural similarities. Feyre, a mortal huntress, is taken to the fae lands as punishment and finds herself drawn into a dangerous and enchanting world. Like Cinderella, she must navigate a dangerous court, deal with a cruel matriarchal figure (though in a different capacity), and faces enchantment and transformation.

### 8. Wicked: Memorial Ball by Gregory Maguire

This is the third book in Maguire's Wicked series, which reimagines The Wizard of Oz. However, Memorial Ball specifically features a narrative thread that directly parallels Cinderella. A character named Elphaba attends a ball under a curse, experiencing a magical night and losing an item, mirroring the core elements of the Cinderella story within a much larger, darker fantasy world.

### 9. The Goose Girl by Shannon Hale

This novel draws inspiration from various fairy tales, including Cinderella. Ani, a princess on her way to marry a foreign prince, is betrayed by her lady-in-waiting and forced to live as a common goose girl. She must find her courage and her voice to reclaim her rightful place, much like Cinderella finding her own strength. The story emphasizes resilience, identity, and the power of speech.

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
