UNDERSTANDING THE ETHICAL PRINCIPLES OF SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH

THE FOUNDATION OF ALL HUMAN SUBJECTS RESEARCH, INCLUDING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL STUDIES, RESTS UPON A BEDROCK OF ETHICAL PRINCIPLES. THESE PRINCIPLES ARE NOT MERE GUIDELINES; THEY ARE THE MORAL COMPASS THAT DIRECTS RESEARCHERS IN THEIR INTERACTIONS WITH PARTICIPANTS AND IN THE DESIGN AND EXECUTION OF THEIR STUDIES. FAMILIARITY WITH THESE CORE TENETS IS PARAMOUNT FOR CORRECTLY ANSWERING QUESTIONS WITHIN CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH MODULES.

THE BELMONT REPORT: AUTONOMY, BENEFICENCE, AND JUSTICE

THE BELMONT REPORT, A SEMINAL DOCUMENT IN HUMAN SUBJECTS RESEARCH ETHICS, OUTLINES THREE FUNDAMENTAL ETHICAL PRINCIPLES THAT ARE CENTRAL TO CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH. UNDERSTANDING EACH PRINCIPLE AND ITS IMPLICATIONS IS KEY TO MASTERING THE ASSOCIATED QUIZ QUESTIONS. AUTONOMY EMPHASIZES RESPECT FOR PERSONS, RECOGNIZING INDIVIDUALS' RIGHT TO MAKE THEIR OWN DECISIONS ABOUT PARTICIPATION IN RESEARCH. THIS TRANSLATES TO THE REQUIREMENT FOR INFORMED CONSENT. BENEFICENCE DICTATES THE OBLIGATION TO PROTECT PARTICIPANTS FROM HARM AND TO MAXIMIZE POTENTIAL BENEFITS WHILE MINIMIZING RISKS. THIS PRINCIPLE ENCOURAGES RESEARCHERS TO CONSIDER THE WELL-BEING OF PARTICIPANTS THROUGHOUT THE STUDY. JUSTICE CONCERNS THE FAIR DISTRIBUTION OF THE BURDENS AND BENEFITS OF RESEARCH, ENSURING THAT NO PARTICULAR GROUP IS UNDULY EXPLOITED OR EXCLUDED FROM POTENTIAL BENEFITS.

THE IMPORTANCE OF RESPECT FOR PERSONS

RESPECT FOR PERSONS, AS ENSHRINED IN THE PRINCIPLE OF AUTONOMY, REQUIRES TREATING INDIVIDUALS AS AUTONOMOUS AGENTS CAPABLE OF MAKING THEIR OWN DECISIONS. THIS MEANS PROVIDING THEM WITH SUFFICIENT INFORMATION TO MAKE AN INFORMED CHOICE ABOUT PARTICIPATION, AND PROTECTING THOSE WITH DIMINISHED AUTONOMY. QUESTIONS IN THE CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH OFTEN DELVE INTO SCENARIOS ILLUSTRATING HOW TO UPHOLD THIS PRINCIPLE, SUCH AS ENSURING COMPREHENSION OF STUDY DETAILS AND ALLOWING PARTICIPANTS TO WITHDRAW AT ANY TIME WITHOUT PENALTY.

APPLYING THE PRINCIPLE OF BENEFICENCE

BENEFICENCE INVOLVES A TWO-PART DUTY: TO DO NO HARM AND TO MAXIMIZE POSSIBLE GOOD. RESEARCHERS MUST CAREFULLY ASSESS THE POTENTIAL RISKS ASSOCIATED WITH THEIR STUDY, WHICH IN SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH CAN INCLUDE PSYCHOLOGICAL DISTRESS, SOCIAL STIGMA, OR BREACHES OF PRIVACY. THEY MUST THEN IMPLEMENT MEASURES TO MITIGATE THESE RISKS AND ENSURE THAT THE POTENTIAL BENEFITS TO PARTICIPANTS AND SOCIETY OUTWEIGH ANY POTENTIAL HARMS. CITI MODULES FREQUENTLY TEST UNDERSTANDING OF RISK ASSESSMENT AND MITIGATION STRATEGIES.

ENSURING JUSTICE IN RESEARCH

THE PRINCIPLE OF JUSTICE DEMANDS FAIRNESS IN THE SELECTION OF RESEARCH PARTICIPANTS AND IN THE DISTRIBUTION OF RESEARCH OUTCOMES. THIS MEANS THAT THE SELECTION OF PARTICIPANTS SHOULD NOT BE BASED ON CONVENIENCE OR VULNERABILITY, BUT ON SCIENTIFIC RELEVANCE TO THE RESEARCH QUESTION. FURTHERMORE, THE BENEFITS DERIVED FROM RESEARCH SHOULD BE ACCESSIBLE TO THOSE WHO PARTICIPATED, AND SOCIETY AT LARGE SHOULD BENEFIT FROM THE KNOWLEDGE GAINED.

KEY CONCEPTS IN PROTECTING HUMAN SUBJECTS

PROTECTING HUMAN SUBJECTS IS THE OVERARCHING GOAL OF ETHICAL RESEARCH. CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL

RESEARCH EXTENSIVELY COVERS VARIOUS CONCEPTS AND PRACTICES DESIGNED TO SAFEGUARD PARTICIPANTS' RIGHTS, WELFARE, AND DIGNITY. MASTERING THESE CONCEPTS IS ESSENTIAL FOR DEMONSTRATING COMPETENCE IN ETHICAL RESEARCH CONDUCT.

RISK ASSESSMENT AND MINIMIZATION

A CRITICAL COMPONENT OF PROTECTING HUMAN SUBJECTS INVOLVES CONDUCTING A THOROUGH RISK ASSESSMENT. RESEARCHERS MUST IDENTIFY POTENTIAL RISKS ASSOCIATED WITH THEIR STUDY, WHICH CAN RANGE FROM MINIMAL RISK (WHERE THE PROBABILITY AND MAGNITUDE OF HARM ARE NOT GREATER THAN THOSE ORDINARILY ENCOUNTERED IN DAILY LIFE) TO GREATER THAN MINIMAL RISK. FOR SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH, THESE RISKS MIGHT INCLUDE:

- PSYCHOLOGICAL DISCOMFORT OR STRESS
- BREACHES OF CONFIDENTIALITY
- SOCIAL STIGMA OR LOSS OF REPUTATION
- ECONOMIC OR EMPLOYMENT RISKS
- PHYSICAL DISCOMFORT (E.G., FROM LENGTHY SURVEYS OR INTERVIEWS)

MINIMIZING THESE RISKS INVOLVES IMPLEMENTING APPROPRIATE SAFEGUARDS. THIS COULD INCLUDE USING SECURE DATA STORAGE, ANONYMIZING DATA, ENSURING PARTICIPANTS UNDERSTAND THEY CAN SKIP QUESTIONS THEY FIND UNCOMFORTABLE, AND PROVIDING RESOURCES FOR PARTICIPANTS WHO EXPERIENCE DISTRESS.

PRIVACY AND CONFIDENTIALITY

MAINTAINING THE PRIVACY OF PARTICIPANTS AND THE CONFIDENTIALITY OF THEIR DATA ARE CORNERSTONES OF ETHICAL RESEARCH. PRIVACY REFERS TO A PERSON'S RIGHT TO CONTROL ACCESS TO THEMSELVES AND THEIR PERSONAL INFORMATION. CONFIDENTIALITY, ON THE OTHER HAND, REFERS TO THE RESEARCHER'S OBLIGATION TO PROTECT PARTICIPANT DATA FROM UNAUTHORIZED DISCLOSURE. CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH ANSWERS OFTEN REVOLVE AROUND UNDERSTANDING THE DISTINCTIONS AND THE METHODS USED TO PROTECT THIS INFORMATION.

- **PRIVACY MEASURES:** CONDUCTING RESEARCH IN PRIVATE SETTINGS, USING ANONYMOUS IDENTIFICATION METHODS.
- **CONFIDENTIALITY MEASURES:** STORING DATA SECURELY, ENCRYPTING DIGITAL FILES, REMOVING IDENTIFYING INFORMATION FROM RESEARCH RECORDS, AND USING PSEUDONYMS OR CODES INSTEAD OF NAMES.

RESEARCHERS MUST CLEARLY EXPLAIN THEIR PRIVACY AND CONFIDENTIALITY PROCEDURES TO PARTICIPANTS DURING THE INFORMED CONSENT PROCESS.

INFORMED CONSENT PROCESS

THE INFORMED CONSENT PROCESS IS A DYNAMIC EXCHANGE OF INFORMATION BETWEEN THE RESEARCHER AND THE PARTICIPANT, ENSURING THAT THE PARTICIPANT HAS VOLUNTARILY AGREED TO PARTICIPATE AFTER UNDERSTANDING THE NATURE OF THE RESEARCH, ITS RISKS AND BENEFITS, AND THEIR RIGHTS. CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH FREQUENTLY TESTS THE UNDERSTANDING OF THE ELEMENTS THAT CONSTITUTE VALID INFORMED CONSENT.

- **ELEMENTS OF INFORMED CONSENT:**
 - STATEMENT OF RESEARCH PURPOSE

- DESCRIPTION OF PROCEDURES
- IDENTIFICATION OF RISKS AND DISCOMFORTS
- DESCRIPTION OF BENEFITS
- DISCLOSURE OF ALTERNATIVE PROCEDURES
- EXPLANATION OF CONFIDENTIALITY MEASURES
- COMPENSATION FOR PARTICIPATION (IF ANY)
- CONTACT INFORMATION FOR QUESTIONS
- STATEMENT OF VOLUNTARY PARTICIPATION AND RIGHT TO WITHDRAW

IT'S CRUCIAL THAT CONSENT IS OBTAINED FREELY, WITHOUT COERCION OR UNDUE INFLUENCE, AND THAT PARTICIPANTS ARE GIVEN AMPLE OPPORTUNITY TO ASK QUESTIONS.

THE ROLE OF THE INSTITUTIONAL REVIEW BOARD (IRB)

THE INSTITUTIONAL REVIEW BOARD (IRB) PLAYS A PIVOTAL ROLE IN THE ETHICAL OVERSIGHT OF RESEARCH INVOLVING HUMAN SUBJECTS. UNDERSTANDING THE IRB'S FUNCTION AND ITS REVIEW PROCESS IS A CORE COMPONENT OF CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH.

IRB REVIEW PROCESS

BEFORE ANY RESEARCH INVOLVING HUMAN PARTICIPANTS CAN COMMENCE, IT MUST BE REVIEWED AND APPROVED BY AN IRB. THE IRB IS A COMMITTEE, TYPICALLY COMPRISED OF SCIENTISTS, NON-SCIENTISTS, AND COMMUNITY MEMBERS, RESPONSIBLE FOR ENSURING THAT RESEARCH PROTOCOLS MEET ETHICAL AND REGULATORY STANDARDS. THEY REVIEW RESEARCH PROPOSALS TO ASSESS THE ADEQUACY OF THE INFORMED CONSENT PROCESS, THE MINIMIZATION OF RISKS, THE EQUITABLE SELECTION OF SUBJECTS, AND THE OVERALL PROTECTION OF PARTICIPANT WELFARE. CITI MODULES WILL OFTEN PRESENT SCENARIOS REQUIRING KNOWLEDGE OF WHEN IRB APPROVAL IS NEEDED AND THE DIFFERENT LEVELS OF REVIEW (E.G., EXEMPT, EXPEDITED, FULL BOARD REVIEW).

TYPES OF IRB REVIEW

THE LEVEL OF IRB REVIEW DEPENDS ON THE POTENTIAL RISKS ASSOCIATED WITH THE RESEARCH. FOR SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH, COMMON REVIEW CATEGORIES INCLUDE:

- **EXEMPT REVIEW:** FOR RESEARCH THAT PRESENTS NO MORE THAN MINIMAL RISK AND FALLS INTO SPECIFIC CATEGORIES, SUCH AS CERTAIN EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH OR SURVEYS OF PUBLIC DATA.
- **EXPEDITED REVIEW:** FOR RESEARCH THAT INVOLVES MINIMAL RISK BUT DOES NOT FIT THE EXEMPT CATEGORIES, OR FOR MINOR MODIFICATIONS TO APPROVED RESEARCH. EXAMPLES INCLUDE MOST SURVEY RESEARCH OR INTERVIEWS THAT DO NOT INVOLVE SENSITIVE TOPICS.
- **FULL BOARD REVIEW:** FOR RESEARCH THAT PRESENTS MORE THAN MINIMAL RISK OR INVOLVES VULNERABLE POPULATIONS. THIS REQUIRES REVIEW BY THE ENTIRE IRB COMMITTEE.

UNDERSTANDING THESE DISTINCTIONS IS CRUCIAL FOR ANSWERING CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH QUESTIONS CORRECTLY REGARDING WHEN AND HOW TO SUBMIT RESEARCH FOR IRB REVIEW.

INFORMED CONSENT: PRINCIPLES AND PRACTICES

INFORMED CONSENT IS MORE THAN JUST A SIGNATURE ON A FORM; IT'S AN ONGOING PROCESS THAT EMPOWERS INDIVIDUALS TO MAKE AUTONOMOUS DECISIONS ABOUT THEIR PARTICIPATION IN RESEARCH. THE CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH MODULES DEDICATE SIGNIFICANT ATTENTION TO THIS CRITICAL ETHICAL REQUIREMENT.

KEY ELEMENTS OF THE INFORMED CONSENT DOCUMENT

A WELL-WRITTEN INFORMED CONSENT DOCUMENT IS CLEAR, CONCISE, AND COMPREHENSIVE. IT SHOULD AVOID JARGON AND TECHNICAL LANGUAGE, MAKING IT UNDERSTANDABLE TO INDIVIDUALS WITH VARYING EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUNDS. THE DOCUMENT MUST EXPLICITLY STATE THE PURPOSE OF THE RESEARCH, THE PROCEDURES INVOLVED, AND ANY FORESEEABLE RISKS OR DISCOMFORTS. CRUCIALLY, IT MUST INFORM PARTICIPANTS OF THEIR RIGHT TO REFUSE TO PARTICIPATE OR TO WITHDRAW FROM THE STUDY AT ANY TIME WITHOUT PENALTY. CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH ANSWERS OFTEN HINGE ON IDENTIFYING WHETHER ALL NECESSARY ELEMENTS ARE PRESENT AND CLEARLY COMMUNICATED IN HYPOTHETICAL CONSENT FORMS.

OBTAINING AND DOCUMENTING CONSENT

THE PROCESS OF OBTAINING CONSENT SHOULD BE CONDUCTED IN A LANGUAGE AND MANNER THAT THE PARTICIPANT CAN UNDERSTAND. THIS MIGHT INVOLVE TRANSLATING CONSENT FORMS, USING VISUAL AIDS, OR CONDUCTING VERBAL CONSENT IN THE PRESENCE OF A WITNESS, DEPENDING ON THE CONTEXT AND PARTICIPANT NEEDS. FOR SOME POPULATIONS, SUCH AS THOSE WITH LIMITED LITERACY OR ENGLISH PROFICIENCY, ALTERNATIVE METHODS OF OBTAINING AND DOCUMENTING CONSENT MAY BE NECESSARY AND ARE OFTEN TESTED IN CITI QUIZZES.

WAIVER OF INFORMED CONSENT

IN CERTAIN LIMITED CIRCUMSTANCES, AN IRB MAY APPROVE A WAIVER OR ALTERATION OF INFORMED CONSENT. THIS TYPICALLY OCCURS WHEN THE RESEARCH MEETS SPECIFIC CRITERIA, SUCH AS THE RESEARCH COULD NOT PRACTICABLY BE CARRIED OUT WITHOUT THE WAIVER, AND THE WAIVER WILL NOT ADVERSELY AFFECT THE RIGHTS AND WELFARE OF THE SUBJECTS. CITI MODULES MAY PRESENT SCENARIOS WHERE A WAIVER OF CONSENT IS APPROPRIATE, TESTING THE UNDERSTANDING OF THESE SPECIFIC CONDITIONS.

PRIVACY AND CONFIDENTIALITY IN RESEARCH

THE PROTECTION OF PARTICIPANT PRIVACY AND THE CONFIDENTIALITY OF THEIR DATA ARE FUNDAMENTAL ETHICAL OBLIGATIONS IN SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH. CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH EMPHASIZES THE PRACTICAL MEASURES RESEARCHERS MUST TAKE TO UPHOLD THESE PRINCIPLES.

DISTINGUISHING PRIVACY FROM CONFIDENTIALITY

AS MENTIONED EARLIER, PRIVACY RELATES TO AN INDIVIDUAL'S RIGHT TO CONTROL INFORMATION ABOUT THEMSELVES, WHILE CONFIDENTIALITY IS THE RESEARCHER'S COMMITMENT TO PROTECTING THAT INFORMATION ONCE IT HAS BEEN SHARED. UNDERSTANDING THIS DISTINCTION IS VITAL FOR CORRECTLY ANSWERING QUESTIONS RELATED TO DATA PROTECTION IN CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH.

METHODS FOR ENSURING DATA CONFIDENTIALITY

RESEARCHERS EMPLOY VARIOUS METHODS TO ENSURE DATA CONFIDENTIALITY. THESE INCLUDE:

- **ANONYMIZATION:** REMOVING ALL IDENTIFYING INFORMATION FROM DATA SO THAT IT CANNOT BE LINKED BACK TO AN INDIVIDUAL.
- **DE-IDENTIFICATION:** REMOVING DIRECT IDENTIFIERS (LIKE NAMES OR ADDRESSES) BUT RETAINING INDIRECT IDENTIFIERS THAT COULD STILL POTENTIALLY IDENTIFY A PERSON.
- **SECURE DATA STORAGE:** STORING PHYSICAL DOCUMENTS IN LOCKED CABINETS AND DIGITAL DATA ON PASSWORD-PROTECTED, ENCRYPTED COMPUTERS OR SECURE SERVERS.
- **LIMITED ACCESS:** RESTRICTING ACCESS TO RESEARCH DATA ONLY TO AUTHORIZED RESEARCH PERSONNEL.
- **DATA DESTRUCTION:** ESTABLISHING PROTOCOLS FOR THE SECURE DESTRUCTION OF DATA ONCE IT IS NO LONGER NEEDED.

CITI MODULES WILL OFTEN PRESENT SCENARIOS ASKING ABOUT THE APPROPRIATE METHODS FOR PROTECTING DIFFERENT TYPES OF DATA.

BREACHES OF CONFIDENTIALITY

A BREACH OF CONFIDENTIALITY CAN HAVE SEVERE CONSEQUENCES FOR PARTICIPANTS, INCLUDING REPUTATIONAL DAMAGE, SOCIAL STIGMA, OR DISCRIMINATION. RESEARCHERS MUST BE VIGILANT IN PREVENTING SUCH BREACHES AND HAVE PROTOCOLS IN PLACE FOR RESPONDING TO THEM IF THEY OCCUR. UNDERSTANDING THE IMPLICATIONS OF A BREACH IS OFTEN TESTED IN CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH SCENARIOS.

VULNERABLE POPULATIONS IN SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH

CERTAIN POPULATIONS ARE CONSIDERED VULNERABLE BECAUSE THEY MAY HAVE REDUCED AUTONOMY OR BE AT INCREASED RISK OF COERCION OR UNDUE INFLUENCE. CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH PROVIDES SPECIFIC GUIDANCE ON ETHICALLY ENGAGING WITH THESE GROUPS.

IDENTIFYING VULNERABLE POPULATIONS

VULNERABLE POPULATIONS MAY INCLUDE CHILDREN, PRISONERS, PREGNANT WOMEN, INDIVIDUALS WITH COGNITIVE IMPAIRMENTS, AND ECONOMICALLY OR EDUCATIONALLY DISADVANTAGED PERSONS. THE CITI PROGRAM EMPHASIZES THAT THESE GROUPS REQUIRE ADDITIONAL PROTECTIONS TO ENSURE THEIR RIGHTS AND WELFARE ARE FULLY RESPECTED. FOR EXAMPLE, RESEARCH INVOLVING CHILDREN TYPICALLY REQUIRES PARENTAL PERMISSION AND CHILD ASSENT.

SPECIAL PROTECTIONS FOR VULNERABLE GROUPS

WHEN CONDUCTING RESEARCH WITH VULNERABLE POPULATIONS, RESEARCHERS MUST IMPLEMENT ENHANCED SAFEGUARDS. THIS MIGHT INVOLVE:

- MINIMIZING RISKS AND MAXIMIZING BENEFITS FOR ALL VULNERABLE PARTICIPANTS.

CONFLICTS OF INTEREST IN RESEARCH

A CONFLICT OF INTEREST (COI) ARISES WHEN AN INDIVIDUAL'S PERSONAL INTERESTS (FINANCIAL, PROFESSIONAL, OR OTHERWISE) COULD COMPROMISE OR APPEAR TO COMPROMISE THEIR OBJECTIVITY IN CONDUCTING OR REPORTING RESEARCH. CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH ADDRESSES HOW TO IDENTIFY AND MANAGE COIS.

IDENTIFYING AND DISCLOSING CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

RESEARCHERS ARE OBLIGATED TO DISCLOSE ANY POTENTIAL CONFLICTS OF INTEREST TO THEIR INSTITUTION AND, IN MANY

CASES, TO THE PARTICIPANTS THEMSELVES. THIS DISCLOSURE ALLOWS FOR TRANSPARENCY AND HELPS MAINTAIN PUBLIC TRUST IN THE RESEARCH PROCESS. COMMON CONFLICTS CAN INCLUDE FINANCIAL INTERESTS IN A COMPANY THAT MANUFACTURES A PRODUCT BEING STUDIED, OR SIGNIFICANT RELATIONSHIPS WITH INDIVIDUALS OR ORGANIZATIONS INVOLVED IN THE RESEARCH.

MANAGING AND MITIGATING CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

ONCE IDENTIFIED, CONFLICTS OF INTEREST MUST BE MANAGED OR ELIMINATED TO ENSURE THE INTEGRITY OF THE RESEARCH. MANAGEMENT STRATEGIES CAN INCLUDE:

- INDEPENDENT REVIEW OF DATA.
- PUBLIC DISCLOSURE OF THE CONFLICT.
- MODIFICATION OF THE RESEARCH PLAN.
- DIVESTITURE OF THE CONFLICTING INTEREST.
- RECUSAL FROM DECISION-MAKING.

UNDERSTANDING RESEARCH MISCONDUCT

RESEARCH MISCONDUCT ENCOMPASSES BEHAVIORS THAT SIGNIFICANTLY DEVIATE FROM ACCEPTED PRACTICES IN PROPOSING, PERFORMING, OR REVIEWING RESEARCH, OR IN REPORTING RESEARCH RESULTS. THIS INCLUDES FABRICATION (MAKING UP DATA), FALSIFICATION (MANIPULATING DATA OR RESULTS), AND PLAGIARISM (APPROPRIATING THE LANGUAGE OR IDEAS OF OTHERS WITHOUT PROPER ATTRIBUTION). CITI MODULES PROVIDE DEFINITIONS AND EXAMPLES OF THESE SERIOUS ETHICAL VIOLATIONS AND OUTLINE REPORTING PROCEDURES.

WHISTLEBLOWER PROTECTIONS

INDIVIDUALS WHO REPORT SUSPECTED RESEARCH MISCONDUCT IN GOOD FAITH ARE OFTEN PROTECTED FROM RETALIATION. UNDERSTANDING THESE PROTECTIONS ENCOURAGES REPORTING AND HELPS MAINTAIN THE INTEGRITY OF THE RESEARCH ENTERPRISE.

COMMON CHALLENGES AND STRATEGIES FOR CITI TRAINING SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH ANSWERS
