ARTIFICIALITY THAT UNDERPINS HIS EXISTENCE.

DAISY BUCHANAN: THE GOLDEN GIRL

DAISY BUCHANAN, THE OBJECT OF GATSBY'S ENDURING OBSESSION, REPRESENTS THE ALLURE AND ULTIMATE EMPTINESS OF THE UPPER-CLASS WORLD. BLESSED WITH A CAPTIVATING VOICE AND SOCIAL GRACE, SHE IS THE EMBODIMENT OF THE "GOLDEN GIRL"—BEAUTIFUL, WEALTHY, AND SEEMINGLY UNATTAINABLE. HOWEVER, DAISY IS ALSO PORTRAYED AS INDECISIVE, SUPERFICIAL, AND ULTIMATELY INCAPABLE OF LIVING UP TO GATSBY'S IDEALIZED VISION. HER MARRIAGE TO THE BRUTISH TOM BUCHANAN AND HER INABILITY TO BREAK FREE FROM THE CONSTRAINTS OF HER SOCIAL STANDING UNDERSCORE THE NOVEL'S CRITIQUE OF WEALTH AND ITS CORRUPTING INFLUENCE. HER CHARM IS A POTENT WEAPON, BUT IT ULTIMATELY SERVES TO MASK A DEEPER EMPTINESS.

TOM BUCHANAN: THE EMBODIMENT OF OLD MONEY

TOM BUCHANAN, DAISY'S HUSBAND, IS A HULKING FIGURE OF IMMENSE WEALTH AND PRIVILEGE, REPRESENTING THE ESTABLISHED, "OLD MONEY" ARISTOCRACY OF EAST EGG. ARROGANT, ENTITLED, AND PHYSICALLY IMPOSING, TOM IS A CHARACTER WHOSE PRIVILEGE SHIELDS HIM FROM THE CONSEQUENCES OF HIS ACTIONS. HE IS DEEPLY HYPOCRITICAL, ENGAGING IN AFFAIRS WHILE FIERCELY PROTECTING HIS SOCIAL STANDING AND HIS WIFE'S HONOR. HIS RACISM AND SOCIAL CONSERVATISM REFLECT SOME OF THE LESS PALATABLE ASPECTS OF THE ERA. TOM'S INGRAINED SENSE OF SUPERIORITY AND HIS LACK OF EMPATHY MAKE HIM A FORMIDABLE ANTAGONIST TO GATSBY'S ROMANTIC IDEALISM.

NICK CARRAWAY: THE OBSERVANT NARRATOR

NICK CARRAWAY, THE NOVEL'S NARRATOR, SERVES AS THE READER'S GUIDE THROUGH THE DECADENT WORLD OF WEST EGG AND EAST EGG. A MIDWESTERNER WHO MOVES TO NEW YORK TO LEARN THE BOND BUSINESS, NICK IS BOTH AN OBSERVER AND A PARTICIPANT IN THE EVENTS SURROUNDING GATSBY. - GEORGE WILSON: MYRTLE'S HUSBAND AND THE OWNER OF A GARAGE IN THE VALLEY OF ASHES, GEORGE IS A BROKEN AND DEFEATED MAN WHOSE TRAGEDY UNDERSCORES THE NOVEL'S DEVASTATING CONSEQUENCES.
- MEYER WOLFSHEIM: GATSBY'S SHADY BUSINESS ASSOCIATE, A GAMBLER INVOLVED IN ORGANIZED CRIME, WHO REPRESENTS THE ILLICIT UNDERBELLY OF THE AMERICAN DREAM.

MAJOR THEMES EXPLORED IN "THE GREAT GATSBY"

WEALTH, CLASS, AND SOCIAL STRATIFICATION

FITZGERALD METICULOUSLY DISSECTS THE RIGID SOCIAL HIERARCHY OF THE 1920s, PARTICULARLY THE STARK CONTRAST BETWEEN "OLD MONEY" AND "NEW MONEY." EAST EGG, HOME TO THE ESTABLISHED ARISTOCRACY LIKE THE BUCHANANS, IS PORTRAYED AS INHERENTLY MORE PRIVILEGED AND EXCLUSIVE THAN WEST EGG, WHERE "NEW MONEY" FORTUNES, LIKE GATSBY'S, ARE AMASSED. THIS DIVISION CREATES AN INSURMOUNTABLE BARRIER, DEMONSTRATING THAT WEALTH ALONE CANNOT BUY ENTRY INTO THE HIGHEST ECHELONS OF SOCIETY. THE NOVEL CRITIQUES THE INHERITED PRIVILEGE AND THE INHERENT SNOBBERY OF THE OLD GUARD, WHO VIEW GATSBY'S WEALTH AS VULGAR AND UNDESERVED. THE VALLEY OF ASHES, A DESOLATE INDUSTRIAL WASTELAND, SERVES AS A STARK REMINDER OF THE CLASS DIVIDE AND THE HUMAN COST OF THE ERA'S PROSPERITY.

LOVE, OBSESSION, AND ILLUSION

THE PURSUIT OF AN IDEALIZED PAST, RATHER THAN EMBRACING THE PRESENT, LEADS TO TRAGEDY. FITZGERALD PROBES THE NATURE OF LOVE ITSELF, QUESTIONING WHETHER IT CAN SURVIVE THE CORROSIVE EFFECTS OF TIME, SOCIAL PRESSURE, AND PERSONAL DISILLUSIONMENT.

THE PAST AND ITS HOLD ON THE PRESENT

THE PAST EXERTS A POWERFUL AND OFTEN DESTRUCTIVE INFLUENCE ON THE CHARACTERS IN "THE GREAT GATSBY." GATSBY IS DETERMINED TO RECREATE THE PAST, TO RELIVE THE MOMENTS HE SHARED WITH DAISY FIVE YEARS PRIOR. THIS FUTILE ATTEMPT TO CONTROL TIME AND REWRITE HISTORY ULTIMATELY LEADS TO HIS DOWNFALL. NICK CARRAWAY, THE NARRATOR, ALSO GRAPPLES WITH THE PAST, REFLECTING ON THE MORAL LESSONS LEARNED AND THE DISILLUSIONMENT HE EXPERIENCED. FITZGERALD SUGGESTS THAT WHILE MEMORIES CAN SHAPE US, AN INABILITY TO LET GO OF THE PAST CAN BE A SIGNIFICANT IMPEDIMENT TO PERSONAL GROWTH AND HAPPINESS.

MORAL DECAY AND SUPERFICIALITY

UNDERNEATH THE GLITTERING SURFACE OF THE ROARING TWENTIES, FITZGERALD EXPOSES A PROFOUND MORAL DECAY AND

PERVASIVE SUPERFICIALITY. THE WEALTHY CHARACTERS, PARTICULARLY TOM AND DAISY, ARE DEPICTED AS CARELESS, SELF-ABSORBED, AND LACKING IN GENUINE EMPATHY. THEIR LIVES ARE CHARACTERIZED BY INFIDELITY, DISHONESTY, AND A PROFOUND DETACHMENT FROM THE CONSEQUENCES OF THEIR ACTIONS. GATSBY'S EXTRAVAGANT PARTIES, WHILE SEEMINGLY VIBRANT, ARE POPULATED BY SHALLOW INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE DRAWN TO HIS WEALTH RATHER THAN HIS PERSON. THE NOVEL CRITIQUES A SOCIETY THAT VALUES APPEARANCES OVER SUBSTANCE, AND WHERE MORAL PRINCIPLES ARE EASILY DISCARDED IN THE PURSUIT OF PLEASURE AND SOCIAL STANDING. THE GREEN LIGHT

PERHAPS THE MOST ICONIC SYMBOL IN "THE GREAT GATSBY" IS THE GREEN LIGHT, SITUATED AT THE END OF DAISY BUCHANAN'S DOCK ACROSS THE BAY FROM GATSBY'S MANSION. FOR GATSBY, THIS LIGHT REPRESENTS HIS IDEALIZED DREAM OF DAISY, THE PROMISE OF THEIR REUNION, AND THE UNATTAINABLE FUTURE HE DESPERATELY SEEKS. IT IS A BEACON OF HOPE, A TANGIBLE REPRESENTATION OF HIS ASPIRATIONS, AND A CONSTANT REMINDER OF THE DISTANCE—BOTH PHYSICAL AND EMOTIONAL—THAT SEPARATES HIM FROM HIS GOAL. THE FADING OF THE GREEN LIGHT AS GATSBY ACHIEVES HIS DREAM SUGGESTS THE EPHEMERAL NATURE OF HAPPINESS AND THE ILLUSION THAT LIES AT THE HEART OF HIS QUEST.

THE EYES OF DOCTOR T. J. ECKLEBURG

THE BILLBOARD OF DOCTOR T. J. ECKLEBURG, A FADED ADVERTISEMENT FOR AN OCULIST FEATURING GIANT, DISEMBODIED EYES, OVERLOOKS THE VALLEY OF ASHES. THESE EYES ARE OFTEN INTERPRETED AS THE EYES OF GOD, WATCHING OVER THE MORAL WASTELAND OF THE ERA, OR AS A SYMBOL OF JUDGMENT AND A LOST SENSE OF SPIRITUAL DIRECTION. IN A WORLD CONSUMED BY MATERIALISM AND MORAL INDIFFERENCE, THE VACANT GAZE OF ECKLEBURG'S EYES SEEMS TO OFFER NO SOLACE OR DIVINE INTERVENTION, REFLECTING THE SPIRITUAL EMPTINESS OF THE TIME. GEORGE WILSON, IN HIS DESPAIR, EVEN EQUATES THEM WITH THE EYES OF GOD, HIGHLIGHTING THE DESPERATE SEARCH FOR MEANING IN A GODLESS WORLD.

GATSBY'S MANSION AND PARTIES

GATSBY'S OPULENT MANSION AND HIS LEGENDARY, EXTRAVAGANT PARTIES ARE POWERFUL SYMBOLS OF HIS WEALTH, HIS SOCIAL ASPIRATIONS, AND HIS DESPERATE ATTEMPT TO ATTRACT DAISY. THE MANSION ITSELF IS A MONUMENT TO HIS SUCCESS, A GILDED CAGE DESIGNED TO IMPRESS AND ENTICE. THE PARTIES, WHILE FILLED WITH A SUPERFICIAL GAIETY, ARE ULTIMATELY EMPTY, POPULATED BY UNINVITED GUESTS WHO CARE LITTLE FOR GATSBY HIMSELF. THEY REPRESENT THE SUPERFICIALITY AND EXCESS OF THE JAZZ AGE, A SPECTACLE OF WEALTH DESIGNED TO MASK A DEEP-SEATED LONELINESS AND THE ABSENCE OF GENUINE CONNECTION. THE SHEER SCALE OF HIS HOSPITALITY IS A TESTAMENT TO HIS SINGULAR FOCUS ON DAISY.

THE VALLEY OF ASHES

THE VALLEY OF ASHES, A BLEAK INDUSTRIAL WASTELAND SITUATED BETWEEN WEST EGG AND NEW YORK CITY, SERVES AS A STARK SYMBOL OF THE SOCIAL AND MORAL DECAY THAT UNDERPINS THE ERA'S PROSPERITY.
