Cory, however, yearns for a different path, leading to intense clashes over education, career, and the definition of success.

What message does 'Fences' convey about forgiveness and reconciliation?

'Fences' explores the complexities of forgiveness and reconciliation. While there are moments of profound hurt and betrayal, the play ultimately suggests that healing and moving forward often require confronting the past, acknowledging pain, and finding a way to accept loved ones, flaws and all, for the sake of family.
