While predating the film's setting, Lepore's book explores the deep-seated history of racial tension, social unrest, and clandestine networks within New York City. It illustrates that the kind of societal fault lines and hidden conspiracies depicted in "Gangs of New York" have roots stretching back much further in the city's past. The book reveals the recurring patterns of power struggles and the marginalized groups fighting for survival.

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
