THIS COMING-OF-AGE STORY FOLLOWS LILY OWENS, A 14-YEAR-OLD GIRL WHO ESCAPES HER ABUSIVE FATHER AND TRAVELS TO TIBURON, SOUTH CAROLINA, WITH HER CAREGIVER, ROSALEEN. LILY SEEKS REFUGE WITH THE BOATWRIGHT SISTERS, BLACK BEEKEEPERS WHO BECOME HER SURROGATE FAMILY. THE NOVEL EXPLORES THEMES OF RACIAL PREJUDICE, MATERNAL LOVE, AND FINDING ONE'S PLACE IN THE WORLD, SET AGAINST THE BACKDROP OF THE CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT.

4. A LESSON BEFORE DYING BY ERNEST J. GAINES

SET IN LOUISIANA IN 1948, THIS POWERFUL NOVEL CENTERS ON GRANT WIGGINS, A YOUNG BLACK TEACHER WHO IS TASKED WITH PREPARING A DEATH-ROW INMATE, JEFFERSON, FOR HIS EXECUTION. JEFFERSON, A SIMPLE-MINDED FIELD HAND, IS WRONGLY CONVICTED OF MURDER AND SENTENCED TO THE ELECTRIC CHAIR. GRANT MUST OVERCOME HIS OWN CYNICISM AND DESPAIR TO INSTILL A SENSE OF DIGNITY AND HUMANITY IN JEFFERSON BEFORE HIS DEATH.

5. THE COLOR PURPLE BY ALICE WALKER

THIS PULITZER PRIZE-WINNING NOVEL IS AN EPISTOLARY STORY ABOUT THE LIFE OF CELIE, A POOR, UNEDUCATED BLACK WOMAN LIVING IN THE SOUTHERN UNITED STATES IN THE EARLY 20TH CENTURY. THROUGH HER LETTERS TO GOD AND HER SISTER NETTIE, CELIE CHRONICLES HER JOURNEY OF ABUSE, HARDSHIP, AND EVENTUAL SELF-DISCOVERY. THE BOOK POWERFULLY ADDRESSES THEMES OF RACISM, SEXISM, AND THE RESILIENCE OF THE HUMAN SPIRIT.

6. ABSALOM, ABSALOM! BY WILLIAM FAULKNER

THIS COMPLEX NOVEL EXPLORES THE RISE AND FALL OF THOMAS SUTPEN, A SCOTTISH IMMIGRANT, AND HIS FAMILY IN MISSISSIPPI FROM THE ANTEBELLUM PERIOD THROUGH THE CIVIL WAR AND RECONSTRUCTION. THE NARRATIVE IS INTRICATELY WOVEN THROUGH THE VOICES OF MULTIPLE CHARACTERS ATTEMPTING TO PIECE TOGETHER THE FRAGMENTED HISTORY OF THE SUTPEN DYNASTY. IT DELVES INTO THEMES OF AMBITION, RACE, LEGACY, AND THE ENDURING IMPACT OF THE PAST.

7. ROLL OF THUNDER, HEAR MY CRY BY MILDRED D. TAYLOR

THIS BELOVED CHILDREN'S HISTORICAL NOVEL IS SET IN MISSISSIPPI DURING THE DEPRESSION. IT FOLLOWS THE LOGAN FAMILY, A PROUD BLACK FAMILY WHO OWN THEIR OWN LAND. THE STORY IS TOLD THROUGH THE EYES OF CASSIE LOGAN, A SPIRITED YOUNG GIRL, AS SHE AND HER BROTHERS NAVIGATE RACIAL SEGREGATION AND THE INJUSTICES OF THE JIM CROW SOUTH. THE NOVEL EMPHASIZES FAMILY STRENGTH AND THE FIGHT FOR EQUALITY.

8. INVISIBLE MAN BY RALPH ELLISON

THIS SEMINAL NOVEL TELLS THE STORY OF AN UNNAMED BLACK NARRATOR'S JOURNEY THROUGH AMERICA IN SEARCH OF IDENTITY AND BELONGING. FROM HIS EXPULSION FROM A SOUTHERN BLACK COLLEGE TO HIS EXPERIENCES IN HARLEM, THE PROTAGONIST GRAPPLES WITH RACISM, SOCIAL INVISIBILITY, AND THE STRUGGLE TO DEFINE HIMSELF AGAINST SOCIETAL EXPECTATIONS. THE BOOK IS A PROFOUND EXPLORATION OF RACE, IDENTITY, AND ALIENATION IN MID-20TH CENTURY AMERICA.

9. ROOTS: THE SAGA OF AN AMERICAN FAMILY BY ALEX HALEY

THIS BIOGRAPHICAL NOVEL CHRONICLES THE LINEAGE OF THE AUTHOR, BEGINNING WITH KUNTA KINTE, WHO IS CAPTURED IN THE GAMBIA AND BROUGHT TO AMERICA AS A SLAVE IN THE 18TH CENTURY. THE NARRATIVE FOLLOWS KUNTA AND HIS DESCENDANTS AS THEY ENDURE THE HORRORS OF SLAVERY AND STRIVE FOR FREEDOM AND IDENTITY.
