THE NARRATIVE'S FOCUS ON TISH'S PERSPECTIVE PROVIDES A UNIQUE AND POWERFUL LENS THROUGH WHICH TO VIEW THESE INJUSTICES, EMPHASIZING THE STRENGTH AND RESILIENCE OF BLACK WOMEN.

KEY CHARACTERS AND THEIR SIGNIFICANCE IN BALDWIN'S NOVEL
