LENNIE EMBODIES A TRAGIC PARADOX: IMMENSE PHYSICAL POWER COUPLED WITH A PROFOUND MENTAL VULNERABILITY. HIS LOVE FOR SOFT THINGS, PARTICULARLY HIS RABBITS, SYMBOLIZES HIS DESIRE FOR GENTLENESS AND COMFORT IN A HARSH ENVIRONMENT. CANDY: THE AGED AND DISCARDED

CANDY, THE AGING SWAMPER WITH ONLY ONE HAND, REPRESENTS THE FATE OF THOSE WHO ARE NO LONGER USEFUL TO SOCIETY. HIS FEAR OF BEING "CANNED" MIRRORS THE ANXIETIES OF MANY OLDER WORKERS. HIS DOG, EQUALLY OLD AND INFIRM, SERVES AS A POIGNANT PARALLEL TO HIS OWN IMPENDING OBSOLESCENCE.

CROOKS: ISOLATION AND RACIAL PREJUDICE

CROOKS, THE STABLE HAND, IS OSTRACIZED DUE TO HIS RACE. HE LIVES IN SEGREGATION AND EXPERIENCES PROFOUND LONELINESS. HIS INITIAL CYNICISM ABOUT GEORGE AND LENNIE'S DREAM IS A TESTAMENT TO HIS OWN DASHED HOPES AND THE SYSTEMIC PREJUDICE HE FACES DAILY. HIS CHARACTER POWERFULLY ILLUSTRATES THE INTERSECTION OF CLASS AND RACE IN SHAPING INDIVIDUAL DESTINIES.

CURLEY: INSECURITY AND AGGRESSION

THE ELUSIVENESS OF THE AMERICAN DREAM

GEORGE AND LENNIE'S DREAM OF OWNING THEIR OWN LAND IS A CLASSIC REPRESENTATION OF THE AMERICAN DREAM—a vision of self-sufficiency, security, and happiness. HOWEVER, STEINBECK PORTRAYS THIS DREAM AS INCREDIBLY DIFFICULT, IF NOT IMPOSSIBLE, TO ACHIEVE FOR THOSE IN THEIR SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC POSITION. THE CONSTANT SETBACKS AND THE ULTIMATE TRAGEDY UNDERSCORE THE HARSH REALITIES THAT OFTEN UNDERMINE ASPIRATIONS DURING THE GREAT DEPRESSION.

FRIENDSHIP AND COMPANIONSHIP

THE HISTORICAL LANDSCAPE: THE GREAT DEPRESSION AND MIGRANT LABOR

TO FULLY APPRECIATE *OF MICE AND MEN*, UNDERSTANDING ITS HISTORICAL CONTEXT IS CRUCIAL. THE NOVEL IS SET DURING THE GREAT DEPRESSION, A PERIOD OF SEVERE ECONOMIC DOWNTURN IN THE UNITED STATES THAT BEGAN IN 1929 AND LASTED THROUGH MUCH OF THE 1930S. JOHN STEINBECK, THROUGH HIS OBSERVATIONS AND EXPERIENCES, CAPTURED THE HARSH REALITIES FACED BY THESE MIGRANT WORKERS, OFTEN REFERRED TO AS "BINDLESTIFFS" OR "SWAMPERS."

THESE WORKERS TYPICALLY LIVED IN TEMPORARY CAMPS, MOVING FROM FARM TO FARM AS SEASONAL WORK BECAME AVAILABLE. THEIR LIVES WERE CHARACTERIZED BY LOW WAGES, POOR LIVING CONDITIONS, AND A CONSTANT STRUGGLE FOR SURVIVAL. THE SOCIAL HIERARCHY ON THE RANCHES, AS DEPICTED IN THE NOVELLA, REFLECTED THE BROADER SOCIETAL STRATIFICATION, WITH OWNERS AND FOREMEN HOLDING SIGNIFICANT POWER OVER THE LABORERS. IT SUGGESTS SOMETHING ONCE APPEALING OR VALUABLE BECOMING CORRUPTED AND DECAYING, MIRRORING THE POTENTIAL DECAY OF DREAMS AND THE HARSH REALITIES THAT CAN TARNISH EVEN THE MOST HOPEFUL VISIONS. IT ALSO FORESHADOWS THE UNFORTUNATE FATE OF LENNIE, WHOSE OWN INNER "WORM" OF UNCONTROLLED STRENGTH LEADS TO TRAGEDY.

THE SNAKE AND THE DEAD MOUSE
