BACKGROUND AND AUTHOR

ELIE WIESEL'S EARLY LIFE

ELIE WIESEL WAS BORN IN 1928 IN SIGHET, A SMALL TOWN IN TRANSYLVANIA, ROMANIA. HIS EARLY YEARS WERE MARKED BY A DEEPLY RELIGIOUS JEWISH UPBRINGING, WHICH SHAPED MUCH OF HIS WORLDVIEW. WRITING AND PUBLICATION OF NIGHT

ORIGINALLY PUBLISHED IN YIDDISH IN 1955 UNDER THE TITLE "UN DI VELT HOT GESHVIGN" (AND THE WORLD REMAINED SILENT), NIGHT ELIE WIESEL WAS LATER TRANSLATED INTO FRENCH AND ENGLISH. THE ENGLISH TRANSLATION APPEARED IN 1960, INTRODUCING A WIDER AUDIENCE TO WIESEL'S POWERFUL NARRATIVE. THE BOOK'S PUBLICATION MARKED A TURNING POINT IN HOLOCAUST LITERATURE, AS IT BROUGHT PERSONAL EYEWITNESS TESTIMONY TO THE FOREFRONT OF PUBLIC CONSCIOUSNESS.
