CORE ARGUMENTS IN THE PLUG IN DRUG

IMPACT ON FAMILY DYNAMICS

PASSIVE VIEWING, SHE CLAIMS, LIMITS IMAGINATIVE PLAY AND ORIGINAL THOUGHT, AS TELEVISION PROVIDES READY-MADE IMAGES AND NARRATIVES THAT DISCOURAGE VIEWERS FROM CREATING THEIR OWN MENTAL REPRESENTATIONS OR STORIES.

PSYCHOLOGICAL AND SOCIAL EFFECTS OF TELEVISION

THE PLUG IN DRUG BY MARIE WINN EXPLORES THE BROADER PSYCHOLOGICAL AND SOCIAL CONSEQUENCES OF EXTENSIVE TELEVISION VIEWING. WINN'S RESEARCH AND OBSERVATIONS SUGGEST THAT TELEVISION INFLUENCES COGNITIVE DEVELOPMENT, EMOTIONAL WELL-BEING, AND SOCIAL BEHAVIOR IN SIGNIFICANT WAYS.

SOCIAL ISOLATION AND REDUCED INTERACTION
