BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT OF THERE ARE NO CHILDREN HERE

HIS METICULOUS DOCUMENTATION AND SENSITIVE STORYTELLING CONTRIBUTE TO THE BOOK'S LASTING SIGNIFICANCE AS BOTH A SOCIAL DOCUMENT AND A LITERARY WORK.
