UNDERSTANDING ENVIRONMENTAL SOCIOLOGY

ENVIRONMENTAL SOCIOLOGY IS A SUBFIELD OF SOCIOLOGY THAT FOCUSES ON THE INTERACTIONS BETWEEN SOCIETIES AND THEIR NATURAL ENVIRONMENTS.
