WIDE SARGASSO SEA JEAN RHYS 2 IS A SIGNIFICANT WORK IN POSTCOLONIAL LITERATURE THAT REIMAGINES THE BACKSTORY OF THE CHARACTER BERTHA MASON FROM CHARLOTTE BRONTË'S CLASSIC NOVEL, JANE EYRE. BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT OF WIDE SARGASSO SEA

WIDE SARGASSO SEA, AUTHORED BY JEAN RHYS, WAS PUBLISHED IN 1966 AS A RESPONSE TO THE DOMINANT COLONIAL NARRATIVES OF THE TIME. THEMATIC EXPLORATION IN WIDE SARGASSO SEA
